Mit dem Erwerb einer ProxGate-Lizenz erhält der Kunde das Recht, die Software auf einem einzelnen Server zu installieren und zu nutzen. ProxGate ist für Netze mit 5 bis 100 Benutzern konzipiert. Die Anzahl der möglichen Benutzer pro Server ergibt sich aus Art und Umfang der erworbenen Lizenz. Einzelne Features können sich allerdings durch systemspezifische technische Limits auf eine geringere Benutzeranzahl beschränken. Die lizenzierte Benutzeranzahl bezieht sich daher auf die Anzahl derjenigen Benutzer, die Internetzugang und E-Mail aktiv nutzen. Für einzelne Serverdienste kann die technische Höchstgrenze auch unterhalb der lizenzierten Benutzeranzahl liegen.

Bei manuellen Systemeingriffen können Wechselwirkungen mit der webbasierten Oberfläche auftreten. Diese können zu gravierenden Fehlfunktionen oder Sicherheitslücken führen. Das root-Kennwort, mit dem voller Zugriff auf Betriebssystemebene möglich ist, wird dem Kunden daher nur überlassen, wenn der Kunde den Hersteller vorher ausdrücklich von Gewährleistungs- und Schadenersatzansprüchen befreit. Sofern diese Befreiung nicht vorliegt, hat der Kunde jegliche Versuche zu unterlassen, das root-Kennwort zu erlangen oder zu manipulieren oder das System auf anderem Weg als über die webbasierte Oberfläche zu konfigurieren oder zu verändern.

Für jeden Server, auf dem ProxGate installiert wird, ist eine separate Lizenz erforderlich.

ProxGate beinhaltet ein modernes Kopierschutzverfahren, welches eine Produktaktivierung durch den Hersteller erfordert. Diese kann über das Internet erfolgen. Für die erneute Installation auf demselben Server kann der bereits ermittelte Aktivierungsschlüssel beliebig oft verwendet werden. Bei einem Hardwaretausch ist eine erneute Aktivierung erforderlich. Der Hersteller behält sich vor, nach einer mehrfachen Aktivierung derselben Lizenz die weitere Produktaktivierung über das Internet zu verweigern. Eine erneute Aktivierung ist dann nur noch telefonisch möglich.
